Mit der "Operation Kindertransport" gelang es jüdischen Kindern aus Deutschland. Osterreich und der ehemaligen Tschechoslowakei aus ihren Heimatländern auszureisen und so den Nazis zu entkommen. Das Ziel stand fest, es war England. Für die Kinder – vom drei Monate alten Baby bis zum 17-jährigen Teenager – war die Zukunft unsgewiss und viele von ihnen traten die Reise schweren Herzens an.

"Für das Kind" erinnert an die Ankunft von 10.000 Flüchtlingen zwischen 1938 und 1939 in London. Die fotografischen Arbeiten, 23 Bilder, basieren auf einer Serie von Stillleben, die Dinge zeigen, die die Kinder auf die Reise mitnahmen, als sie in dieser schrecklichen Zeit ihr Zuhause verlassen mussten. Die Fotos zeigen Objekte wie Bücher, private Fotografien, Hausübungshefte, Schulmitteilungen, Puppen, Eislaufschuhe, Kleidungsstücke, Schuhspanner, Bettwäsche und die Schürze einer Mutter.
